Dear Ms. Brown:

Please let this letter and attachments serve as an update to the public comment submitted by Conejos County Clean Water, Inc. (CCCW) on October 12, 2010 for the above referenced petition to the Surface Transportation Board (Board).

The Special Use Permit application submitted by EnergySolutions to Conejos County as the principle corporate entity in the above referenced petition to the Board was objectively and unanimously denied by the Board of County Commissioners, December 6, 2010.

The decision was based on several objective reasons pertaining to the Conejos County Land Use Code; including, but not limited to the fact that the applicant was not willing and able to obtain all land use rights in Conejos County per Section 5.500 Standards of Approval for a Special Use.

The official resolution pertaining to the permit denial will be created by Conejos County officials and submitted to the Board by CCCW when the resolution becomes available to the public. Please note the Special Use permit process was completed in 90-days.

We continue to request your presence in Conejos County for your declaratory order proceedings in Antonito, Colorado, the Conejos County Seat. The Board has determined that the issues are "novel." We request the opportunity to provide oral public comments during the hearing proceeding in Antonito, Colorado.

Additionally, please find attached for your consideration resolutions passed in opposition of the truck to rail transfer of radioactive, hazardous, and toxic waste within 250 feet of the Rio San Antonio a headwaters tributary to the Rio Grande. The resolutions were passed by the following governments and groups in Conejos County: The Town of Antonito, The Town of La Jara, Conejos County Clean Water, Inc., Senior Citizens, Madres Cristianas, South Conejos School District, and the Town of Sanford support the opposition efforts.




