In column (e), if adapted solely to transportation of freight, enter the symbol (F); if solely to passenger transportation, (P); if principally for freight, incidentally for passenger, (PF); if principally for passenger, incidentally for freight, (PF); if for towing, (T); if for lightering, (L), etc.

4. In column (f) show the cargo deadweight tonnage capacity of the ship in tons of 2,240 pounds by deducting the weight of the fuel, water, stores, and damage from the gross weight of the vessel, e.g., show the difference between the displacement light and the displacement loaded after subtracting the weight of the fuel, stores, etc.

SCHEDULE 541. FREIGHT CARRIED DURING THE YEAR

INSTRUCTIONS

Under the Commission's order of September 13, 1963, effective January 1, 1964, all carriers by water subject to the provisions of Parts I and III of the Interstate Commerce Act assigned to Class A and B are required to compile and report freight commodity statistics annually. Reports shall be filed in duplicate in the Bureau of Accounts, Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C. 20423, by March 31 of the year following that for which the report is made.

Tonnage and revenue should be on a billed basis. Classify the commodities carried by the respondent in its water line and motortruck operations and for the respondent in the vessels and motortrucks of other companies (carriers) under contract, in revenue service, the domestic revenues from which are includable in accounts No. 301, "Freight revenue" and 381 "Motor-Carrier revenue" in accordance with the order of this Commission dated September 31, 1963. Maritime carriers should classify commodities the revenue from which are includable in account No. 605, "Freight-Coastwise and intercoastal". Separate the tonnage and revenue for each commodity code between "Joint rail and water traffic" and "All other traffic". The separation as to joint rail and water traffic and all other traffic may be omitted for commodity code 471, "Small packaged freight shipments".

Include under "Joint rail and water traffic" all shipments that, so far as apparent from the information on the waybills or abstracts thereof, are being transported partly by railroad and partly by water when both are used under a common control, management, or arrangement for a continuous carriage or shipment such as traffic moving on joint rail-water and rail-motor-water rates.

Include under "All other traffic" all shipments that, so far as apparent from the information on the waybills or abstracts thereof, are transported from point of origin to point of destination solely by water, solely by truck, partly by water and partly by truck, or by any other combination which does not involve the interchanging of traffic with a railroad company; also, shipments moving on water rates when the carrier by water absorbs out of its port-to-port rates certain charges for switching, terminal, drayage, or other services within a port terminal district.

"Passenger cars, assembled" is confined to vehicles carried as revenue freight on freight rates and does not include those carried as an adjunct to passenger business.

Fuel and stores carried on any vessel for the purpose of operating and maintaining it should not be included in this schedule.

Include under "Joint rail and water traffic" and "All other traffic", the revenues that are applicable to the tonnage.

"Gross freight revenue" means reporting carrier's gross revenue from freight without adjustment for absorption or corrections.

In the "Note" on page 55 show the extent of joint motor-water traffic included in columns (e) and (f).

Commodity codes 01 through 462 shall include shipments weighing 10,000 pounds or more. Shipments of less than 10,000 pounds of one commodity shall be reported under commodity code 471, "Small packaged freight shipments" unless the reporting carrier elects to distribute all revenue freight among the other designated classes.

"Classify" means to assign an article of freight to its appropriate commodity class which may be a 3, 4, or 5-digit number. Always classify an article in the highest digit level possible. Use a 5-digit code if the article may be properly assigned to it. If there is no applicable 5-digit code, use a 4-digit code if available. If there is no applicable 4-digit code, then the article is classified at the 3-digit level.

For a 5-digit code, report the sum of all freight classified thereunder. For a 4-digit code, report the sum of all freight classified thereunder plus the sum of all 5-digit codes where the first four digits match. For a 3-digit code, report the sum of all 4-digit code numbers where the first three digits match, plus 5-digit code numbers where the first three digits match (provided they are not included in 4-digit codes), plus any articles classified at the 3-digit level. Generally the 3-digit codes are used as summaries. The 2-digit level is a summary of 3-digit codes where the first two digits match.

Commodities must not be classified to the codes with a "T" designation. Codes at the 2 and 3 digit level followed by a "T" always are totals of the related higher level codes shown on the report form; codes not so designated may include commodities classified directly thereunder and may not total.

"Piggyback traffic" is classified in the applicable commodity code if the commodity can be identified; where the commodity cannot be identified, classify in code 461 and summarize in code 46.

Codes 44 and 441, "Freight Forwarder Traffic" includes freight traffic shipped by or consigned to any forwarder holding a permit under Part IV of the Interstate Commerce Act.

"Shipper Association or Similar Traffic" Codes 45 and 451, include freight traffic shipped by a non-profit shipper association where the commodity cannot be identified; where the commodity can be identified, classify in the applicable commodity code.
